- 2 Test was for 50 marks based on the syllabus of XIIth std. in the subjects of Maths, English, accounts & Organization of comm. for a duration of 1.5 hours
- 3 Test was conducted on Saturday 6th August, from 10am to 11.30am after half day working, regular lectures of all F. Y. Classes commenced from 25th July
- 4 Qualifying standard in screening test was 50% marks (25 out of 50) the students scoring less than 25 marks have to attend a remedial coaching for two months Sept & Oct. 2018
- 5 Intimation of test was given to students through notice to parents in parents meet

Practice:

1. Inhouse faculty took responsibility of each subject, and got distributed the days for remedial coaching

- 2. 16 days, Sundays and holidays in the month of Sept & Oct, identified and time table with subject, teacher and timing of coaching was convyed to the students
- 3. Coaching was done on non-working days mainly because students & teachers were busy on all working days and students not interested to work beyond 12 noon of working days

Evidence of success: out of 194 students only 16 students could attend maximum number of lectures and their semester end result is waiting in the month of Dec

Problems encountered: 1 Time for remedial coaching was limited due to semester system
